
Camerata – Queensland's Chamber Orchestra was incorporated as an Association in Queensland on 5 January 2007.

To support longevity and build new audiences, we aim to provide opportunities for our orchestra to tour nationally. It is not our intention to remain Queensland's finest secret but instead, to share our work with audiences across the country and overseas.

# **Company Report**

Remarkably, even with persistent Covid-19 challenges, all of Camerata's performances proceeded during 2021, and the organisation secured many events with presenting partners.

After seven years of office space support from QPAC, the sale of QPAC's Merivale Street Studios in South Brisbane led to the relocation of our offices to a leased arrangement at The Stores Building at Brisbane Powerhouse. In these new offices, Camerata is well positioned for exciting collaboration possibilities with the Powerhouse while maintaining our Company-in-Residence arrangement with QPAC. Camerata invited Bamaga Productions to extend their relationship with us by continuing our co-location arrangement in our new premises. Having access to an ongoing, dedicated, professional rehearsal space remains a challenge after this move, and with the continuing development of the Company and its activities, is a critical priority.

Changes in Camerata's team saw the appointment of Michael Sterzinger into the role of Executive Director after Adam Tucker took up a new role at Opera Queensland. Changes also occurred in the Production team, and Camerata's staffing was increased with the appointment of a new Digital Marketing Manager as a direct result of support through a Digital Adaptation Grant from Arts Queensland. That support eventually enabled the creation of a full time, ongoing Marketing Manager position. With board membership turnover due at the 2022 AGM, three new board members were appointed during 2021 to broaden the expertise and connections, and to ensure a smooth transition in 2022.

Camerata worked hard to secure organisational funding for 2022-2025 from the Queensland Government through Arts Queensland, and from the Tim Fairfax Family Foundation. This generous support creates a more secure basis for Camerata to focus on delivering artistic excellence and deep community connection.

Camerata performed three mainstage concert series at the QPAC Concert Hall and Empire Theatres in Toowoomba, presented a recital series at Metro Arts, the Museum of Brisbane and 4MBS Studio, and presented the Orava Quartet, Camerata's Quartet-in-Residence, at The Edge, State Library of Queensland and in Toowoomba at the Empire Theatres. Our residency at the Museum of Brisbane facilitated musical responses to the *City in the Sun* exhibition, and the group toured regional Queensland with first performances at Julia Creek and Cloncurry and culminating in performances at Opera Queensland's *Festival of Outback Opera* in Winton and Longreach.

Despite a last minute COVID disruption, a 2021 high point was Camerata's performances with the multi-award winning singer/songwriter and First Nations artist, Emily Wurramara. Significantly, 2021 also saw Camerata embark on a Reconciliation Action Plan, the organisation and artists having initial meetings with Aunty Nancy Bamaga and Aunty Lesley Williams and a working group was formed.

Camerata expanded its emerging composer commission into the Emerging Composer-In-Residence Program. The 2021 recipient, John Rotar, composed five new works that were given their world premiere performances by Camerata in Winton, at QPAC, at West Village, online in our 5@5 with Camerata series for Australian Music month, and culminating in a virtuosic showpiece for the orchestra that formed the musical backdrop to choreographer Paul Boyd's, "Echo of Reflection" for Queensland Ballet's Summer Soirée series. At the time of writing, Camerata's performance of "Echo of Reflection" has been nominated in the 2022 Art Music Awards.

Partnering with Australian (formerly Melbourne) Digital Concert Hall enabled several Camerata concerts to reach more audiences interstate and abroad. Other digital activity included a livestream from Toowoomba at the Empire Church Theatre of our *Landscapes* concert series, and the expansion of our ROAD (Regional Online Artist Development) program, offering online mentoring to even more regionally based string students and support and professional development for their teachers.

With the re-scheduling of ballet seasons from 2020, and the flexibility of Arts Queensland with our pit services agreement, Camerata performed two large-scale pit-service seasons for Queensland Ballet, QB's long awaited 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Series and Dracula.

Through increased collaboration with The Little Red Company, Camerata performed to a sold-out QPAC Concert Hall in *Rumour Has It*, and for the newly curated *Lord Mayor's Christmas Carols*.

### In Residence



#### **Orava Quartet**

Camerata continued to offer the Orava Quartet a residency in 2021, supporting this outstanding Queensland-based string quartet by presenting them in a featured recital series in Brisbane and Toowoomba, as well as employment opportunities in our mainstage series and commercial activities. The Orava Quartet was also featured in solo roles in Camerata's "Camerata Remastered" series for Elgar's virtuosic orchestral showpiece, *Introduction and Allegro for Strings*.



#### **Emerging Composer**

John Rotar, originally from Bundaberg, Camerata's 2020 emerging composer, was commissioned for the re-newed Camerata Emerging Composer-in-Residence program. This initiative supports the creation of a new regional place-inspired commission for our annual regional tour.

After the disruption of 2020, John's *Plains Baked Golden in the Morning Light*, based on the Winton region, was premiered at Opera Queensland's inaugural *Festival of Outback Opera*. The 300-strong audience at Winton's, Australian Age of Dinosaurs responded very well to this work.

Camerata performed the world premiere of a second Rotar work, *Beyond the Front Door*, in *Camerata Re-Mastered* in March 2021.

Camerata's partner, West Village, supported additional movements to the earlier Rotar work, *Apis Australis*, premiered in May 2021.

Artistic Director, Brendan Joyce, who curated the music for Queensland Ballet's Summer Soiree, suggested Rotar's music for a new 30-minute ballet work. This performance has recently been nominated in the Australian Art Music Awards.



# **Upbeat Emerging Artist Program**

Following a year of disruption, the 2020 artists' involvement was extended. The participants are Ann Carew (Violin), Rebekah Hall (Violin), Sophie Ellis (Viola) and Connor Bishop (Double Bass). The program supports career pathways for talented graduating or recently graduated artists to experience working as an Artist Associate of Camerata and thereby gain valuable industry insight.



# 2021 in review

2021 was exciting and innovative for Camerata. We created and delivered an extensive program, engaging 106 artists across 32 engagements. With three subscription series concerts in Brisbane and Toowoomba, Camerata remains the only Brisbane-based arts organisation to present a subscription series in Brisbane and a regional location.

Camerata presented the *In Recital* Series with partners Metro Arts, Museum of Brisbane and 4MBS Classic FM. Camerata's partnership with West Village continued its focus on supporting Camerata's Upbeat Program.

Camerata appeared in four festivals:

- Brisbane Festival's Street Serenades and The Conference of the Birds
- Opera Queensland's Festival of Outback Opera in Winton and Longreach
- Ipswich Spark Festival's Best of British
- Dots and Loops Nonstop 2021, Erik Griswold's Hollow out of Time

Through three pit services for Queensland Ballet, Camerata reached an audience of 28,000 across 29 performances.

Camerata's commitment to bringing Australian music to audiences was highlighted by including seven Australian composers in our 2021 programming:

In 2021 Camerata performed six world premieres with four of them commissioned by Camerata.

Livestreams, radio and television broadcasts in 2021 include:

- Three subscription series concerts broadcast on ABC Classic.
- Three subscription series concerts were livestreamed.
- Repeated broadcast of Lord Mayors Christmas Carols on Channel Nine to an audience of 1.082 million people.

### **Education & Community Engagement**

#### **Kindergarten Shows at West Village (September)**

Presented by West Village, a quintet from Camerata performed our popular kindergarten show during the September school holidays.

- · Six performances over two days.
- Activating the outdoor space, The Common, entertained an audience of 220 people of all ages.

### Sunshine Coast Chamber Music Festival – Rising Stars Mentorship (March, April & June)

A brand-new festival, the program included the mentoring initiative – Rising Stars.

- Involvement of eight teenage advanced players, from the broader string playing community and Sunshine Coast Youth Orchestra.
- Ten Education Queensland, private school and studio teachers participated in a session as part of their professional development.
- Three Camerata players and festival Artistic Director, Louise King collaborated to deliver the mentoring and coaching session with the players.
- Performance outcome achieved with the students presenting works at the festival's outdoor gala mainstage concert.

#### **Empire Theatre Strings Workshop (November)**

In partnership with the Empire Theatre, Camerata organised a strings workshop with students in Toowoomba attended by students from local schools.

 Five Camerata players convened the two-hour workshop and worked side by side with the 18 student participants.

#### **ROAD Program**

Following a successful trial of the *Regional Online Artist Development Program* in 2020, Camerata's mentoring program *ROAD* was expanded as part of the 2021 program. Working with local string teachers to identify students who would benefit from the sessions, *ROAD* offers mentoring opportunities to regional students and supports local teachers, providing professional development opportunities.

- In 2021 the program was extended to include violin, viola and cello.
- 10 students provided with six, 45-minute online lessons with a dedicated Camerata Artistic Associate.
- All lessons are fully sponsored by Camerata.







### Other Performances & Collaborations

#### **Sinking Cities Creative Development & Showing (Jan & March)**

Despite COVID lockdowns and interruptions the first stages of this project were successfully completed.

- Development of a major new Australian work by an artist trained in Queensland.
- New collaborations between Camerata, The Judith Wright Arts Centre, Rafael Karlen, Pearly Black and The Australian Voices.

#### **Queensland Ballet – 60th Anniversary Gala (March)**

- Engaged 44 artists for 20 calls.
- Sixteen performances for an audience of over 9500.

#### **Orava Quartet – Playful Reverie (March)**

Two performances in Brisbane and Toowoomba for an audience of 140.

#### **Founders Birthday Celebrations (April)**

A musical celebration, honouring Camerata's founder Elizabeth Morgan AM. A massed orchestra of former students, including concertmasters from three of Australia's symphonies and two former leaders of Camerata entertained the invited guests, reduced due to COVID capacity limits.

- 45 former students played live, with another 20 joining from abroad via a recording.
- One new commission, Cameron Patrick's Little Corellas: Allora 1987. This work went on to be
  performed on Camerata's mainstage concert Camerata Re-Mastered and was also performed on the
  Western Queensland tour program.

#### **Queensland Ballet From to Here (April)**

Recording of Robert Davidson's new work From to Here for a future performance by Queensland Ballet.

#### **Brisbane Powerhouse 21st Birthday Celebrations (May)**

A celebration involving many artists of different genres.

· A quintet performed two works with musician William Barton for an audience of 400.

#### **Bee Month at West Village (June)**

Performing outdoors with a focus on activating the precinct in new and interesting ways.

• The performance by string quintet included the world premiere of two new movements of John Rotar's Apis Australis, previously commissioned by West Village.

#### The Little Red Company – Rumour Has It (June)

Presented on the Concert Hall Stage to an audience of over 1400 people.

#### **Ipswich Spark Festival (July)**

Camerata performed with the Ipswich Orpheus Chorale in this celebratory concert Best of British.

- · Camerata's debut appearance at this festival.
- Performed for an audience of 200 with many citing this as their first Camerata experience.

#### Museum of Brisbane (MOB) Residency (July - August)

Response to exhibition City in the Sun.

- Eight Camerata artists responded to works in the exhibition.
- Working live in the space, combined with working in isolation during a COVID lockdown the musicians prepared their responses over two months.
- The work was premiered at a special evening concert and then was performed an additional three times at daytime performances during the museums' opening hours.
- A special encore performance of part of the program was presented at a VIP function for 100 guests, hosted by MOB in November.

### Other Performances & Collaborations

#### Brisbane Festival – Street Serenades (August)

Featuring a string quintet Camerata joined this popular program for a consecutive year, performing with singer Emma Dean.

• Performances held in eight Brisbane suburbs, for a combined audience of over 600 people.

#### **QAGOMA Foundation Dinner (October)**

- Camerata's first performance at the Queensland Art Gallery.
- VIP event for 200 guests.

#### **Edible Encores at West Village (October)**

Impacted on numerous occasions by COVID lockdowns, the final rehearsals and performance of this concert were presented at West Village in October.

- The project included a short film shoot with excerpts of the musician's performances being marketed by the West Village team, introducing Camerata to new audiences and precinct stakeholders.
- An audience of over 100 enjoyed a varied program, experiencing an open rehearsal as well as the performance.

#### **Queensland Ballet – Dracula (November and December)**

- · Camerata's first Lyric Theatre pit engagement.
- Engaged 45 artists for 16 calls.
- Twelve performances for an audience of over 17,000.

#### Queensland Ballet - QB Academy Soiree (December)

A one night only, special performance featuring QB's emerging dancers.

- The program included a 30min work composed by Camerata's Emerging-Composer-in-Residence John Rotar.
- Engaged 16 artists entertaining an audience of 1500.

#### **Lord Mayor's Christmas Carols (December)**

Produced by The Little Red Company, the carols attracted a live audience of over 4800 people.

- 16 Camerata string players engaged.
- Nationally broadcast on Channel 9 on two dates to a television audience of 1.082 million.

#### **Dots and Loops Non-Stop Festival (December)**

As part of this festival, Camerata performed the Brisbane premiere of Erik Griswold's *Hollows Out of Time*, an epic work for string guartet and 'prepared' piano.

- Camerata first premiered this work with Erik Griswold in 2019 at Easter at the Piano Mill. A unique
  venue the Piano Mill is owned by Bruce and Jocelyn Wolfe who were the initial commissioners of this
  work.
- An eight movement, 45-minute work, arguably one of the most substantial art music works to have been created and premiered in Queensland in the last 10 years.

#### Queen of the Nile (December)

- Camerata's first performance at the Redland Performing Arts Centre.
- A repeat of a concert presented in 2020, the program included an appearance by Soprano, Sofia Troncoso.



# **Touring**

Performing in traditional and non-traditional spaces, Camerata's annual Western Queensland Tour involved 15 of Camerata's Artistic Associates, Upbeat Artists and Guest players performing an accessible program of well-known classics and new works. Camerata's commitment to community engagement and education in remote and regional Queensland remains a focus of touring activity.

- Mt Isa: Strings workshops, masterclass and a recording with School of the Air Students.
- Cloncurry: Community rehearsal, school show, kindergarten performances and an evening concert.
- Julia Creek: Community rehearsal, and evening concert in an outdoor 'hay bale' amphitheatre.
- Richmond: Aged care performance, community concert.
- **Hughenden:** Aged care performance, community concert and a pre-show appearance at *Weathering Well*, a touring production starring Jenny Woodward.
- Winton: Aged care performance, and Festival of Outback Opera rehearsal and performance.
- Longreach: Aged care performance, and Festival of Outback Opera performance.

Camerata's performance in Opera Queensland's *Festival of Outback Opera* was a significant collaboration resulting in increased reach and impact for Camerata. Brendan Joyce and Opera Queensland co-curated a unique program of Chamber Orchestra works and opera excerpts for the Longreach and Winton communities, and tourists visiting from across the country.

### The Numbers

- Over 900 people attended Camerata's performances and activities on tour.
- 460 students and local musicians participated in community rehearsals and performances.
- Six activities were dedicated to kindergartens and schools.
- Residents and patients in four aged care homes or hospitals were entertained, experiencing a 60minute concert in comfort.
- Camerata's 'pop-up' concert from Richmond received an initial 1.4k views on Facebook Live. Later views increased this number to over 3000 views.
- As part of this tour, Camerata visited three new locations.
- The program included a world premiere of John Rotar's, *Plains baked golden in the morning light*, commissioned by Camerata in response to Winton.

# **Online and digital**

#### 5@5 with Camerata (August – December)

Following the great success of the 5@5 program during the first lockdown of 2020, Camerata produced additional episodes the first of which was released during the July/August lockdown of 2021. The relevance of the program remained evident. In 2021 the 5@5 program produced:

- 12 episodes.
- Brand new commission and world premiere performance of John Rotar's *Five Fiddle Tunes* performed by violinist Jason Tong.
- The 5@5 series was intertwined with AusMusicMonth an initiative that resulted in an episode per week, specifically featuring Australian artists.
- In addition to Camerata's Artistic Associates the series featured special guest artists,
   Tenzin Choegyal, Emily Wurramara and Alex Raineri.

#### **Broadcasts**

Camerata's subscription series concerts *Camerata Re-Mastered*, *Landscapes* and *The Conference of the Birds* were livestreamed and ABC Classic recorded Camerata Re-Mastered and Landscapes for delayed radio broadcast.

These opportunities increase Camerata's reach and national profile. It is estimated that via the livestreams and radio broadcasts Camerata has reached an audience of over 110,000 people.

#### **Social Media**

Camerata's Facebook reach increased by 68% in 2021.



### Governance

Good corporate governance is central to ensuring the realisation of Camerata's vision, the execution of our mission and the achievement of our core goals.

The Camerata Board maintained its continued commitment to good governance practices as recommended in the Australia Council for the Arts' Essential Governance Practices for Arts Organisations document:

- The Board lays solid foundations for management and oversight
- The Board is structured to add value
- The Board promotes ethical and responsible decision-making
- The Board promotes diversity
- The Board safeguards integrity in financial reporting

The Board meets monthly with sub-committee meetings occurring monthly or bi-monthly. The Chair of each sub-committee submits a report to the Board meeting. The Board works within a number of sub-committees to ensure strategic oversight and governance. Camerata's sub-committees are: Finance and Risk, Art and Audience and Development.

The Executive Director attends all sub-committee and Board meetings. The Artistic Director attends all Art and Audience sub-committee and Board meetings.
